ERNST LUDWIG KIRCHNER

1880	Born on 6 May in Aschaffenburg, the son of a paper chemist
1901–1905	Study of architecture at the Technische Hochschule Dresden, degree
1905	Co-founder of the artists' group Brücke
1909–1911	Summer excursions with Heckel to the Moritzburg Ponds near Dresden
1910	Visit to the collector Gustav Schiefler (1857–1935) – one of the <i>Brücke</i>
	artists' most important patrons and the author of the catalogue raisonné
	of Kirchner's printmaking œuvre (1926/31) – in Hamburg
1911	Move to Berlin, meets his later life companion Erna Schilling (1884–
	1945)
1912–1914	Regular summer stays on the North Sea island of Fehmarn
1913	Disbandment of Brücke
1915	Military service in Halle (Saale) for just a few months before suffering a
	nervous breakdown; in the autumn, release from the military; stays in
	different sanatoria
1916–1922	Exhibitions in the gallery of Ludwig Schames (1852–1922) in Frankfurt
1917	Move to Switzerland; stay of several months in the Bellevue Sanatorium
	in Kreuzlingen on Lake Constance
1918	Move to a farmhouse outside of Frauenkirch near Davos
1925/26	Last visit to Germany with stop in Frankfurt am Main
1937	Labelled a "degenerate artist"
1938	Commits suicide on 15 June in Frauenkirch-Wildboden near Davos

ERICH HECKEL

1883	Born on 31 July in Döbeln, the son of a railway construction engineer
from 1902	Friendship with Karl Schmidt(-Rottluff)
1904–1906	Study of architecture at the Technische Hochschule Dresden
1905	Co-founder of the artists' group Brücke
1907–1910	Stays of several months in the Dangast moor with Schmidt-Rottluff



1909	Trip to Italy; first excursion, with Kirchner, to the Moritzburg Ponds near
	Dresden to study the nude in natural surroundings
1910	Makes acquaintance of the dancer Milda Georgi (1891–1982), also
	known as Siddi Riha; marriage in 1915
1911	Move to Berlin, from now on repeated stays at the Baltic Sea
1913	Disbandment of Brücke
1914	Trip to Belgium and Holland
1915–1918	Medical orderly in Flanders, subsequent return to Berlin
1919–1941	Summer months in Osterholz on the Firth of Flensburg
1937	Labelled a "degenerate artist"
1944	Destruction of his Berlin studio in a bomb attack; move to
	Hemmenhofen on Lake Constance
1949–1955	Professor at the Hochschule der Bildenden Künste in Karlsruhe
1970	Dies on 27 January in Radolfzell on Lake Constance

KARL SCHMIDT-ROTTLUFF

1884	Born on 1 December in Rottluff near Chemnitz, the son of a miller
from 1902	Friendship with Erich Heckel
1905–1906	Study of architecture at the Technische Hochschule Dresden
1905	Co-founder of Brücke
1907–1912	Stays of several months in the Dangast moor, usually with Heckel
1908	Personal acquaintance with the art historian Rosa Schapire (1874–
	1954), the author of the catalogue raisonné of his printmaking œuvre
	(1923)
1910	Initial contact to the poet and art historian Wilhelm Niemeyer (1874–
	1960), soon his most important patron
1911	Move to Berlin
1913	Disbandment of Brücke; first stay at Nidden on the Baltic Sea
1915–1918	Soldier in Northern Russia and Lithuania; return to Berlin after the war
1920–1931	Summer months in Jershöft on the Baltic Sea; various travels
1919	Marriage to the photographer Emy Frisch (1884–1979)
1937	Labelled a "degenerate artist"
1941	Prohibited from practising his profession
1943	Destruction of his Berlin studio by a bomb attack; move to Rottluff
1946	Return to Berlin
1947–1954	Teacher at the Hochschule für Bildende Künste in Berlin-Charlottenburg
1976	Dies on 10 August in West Berlin
